## Superintendent's Notes

### Carlisle County Board of Education Hires new Superintendent

After conducting a search for a new superintendent of schools that began in January the Carlisle County Board of Education hired its new superintendent on March 27, 2008. The Board approved a four-year contract with Dr. Keith Shoulders that will begin on July 1, 2008.

This action took place after a screening committee identified four recommended candidates to the Board. The Board then interviewed the four candidates before offering the contract to Dr. Shoulders.

Dr. Shoulders will come to Carlisle after serving as superintendent of Providence Independent School District from 1990-2004. At that time he left that school district to complete his doctoral studies at the University of Kentucky.

Dr. Shoulders' undergraduate degree was earned in math at Eastern Kentucky University. He later completed his Masters of Education and Rank I in School Administration at Western Kentucky University before earning his Ed.D. in 2004. While completing his doctorate and after, Dr. Shoulders worked in private business and in various capacities in public education.

The career of the Providence, KY native began as a math teacher in the Cloverport Independent School District. He moved to Providence to teach math and later became superintendent. He has a wonderful reputation as a school administrator, and I certainly trust that he will make a wonderful addition to the school community for many years to come.

The screening committee of Tiffany Brown, Rachel Bowles, Kristy Halteman, Jessica Thomas, Ruth Ditsch, and Jay Simmons is owed a debt of gratitude. I know I join the Board in saying thank you to that group for its hard work on behalf of the students and staff. I also know how seriously the Board took its responsibility in filling the position. It is a very tough decision. I know that the diligent work of both groups in laying a good foundation in surfacing quality candidates and in the serious work of checking references and of conducting interviews will pay dividends in the future.

#### **New Board of Education Member**

The vacant seat on the Carlisle County Board of Education will soon be filled. After the seat became vacant the Kentucky Department of Education contacted the school district to begin the work of filling the position. Public advertisements had

to be made giving the public information on how eligible candidates could apply for the position.

The Division 1 seat, which serves the Arlington and Berkley voting precinct, was ultimately applied for by four candidates. Those candidates were interviewed by a three-person committee who were all from outside the county. The state-wide process calls for the committee to be put together by a representative of the Kentucky Department of Education. That person brings in two sitting board of education members from other school districts to conduct the interviews.

The interviews were held on March 26<sup>th</sup>. The committee will make its recommendation to the Kentucky Commissioner of Education who by law has the responsibility to appoint the new board member. We should receive word on the selection within the next few days.

The new member will serve out the remaining term of the vacating board member, which in this case is December 31, 2008. The seat will be up for election this fall. At that time any eligible person may run for the seat.

# CATS Testing in April

Almost all students will be testing in Reading and Math and many will also be testing in Social Studies, Arts and Humanities, Practical Living/Vocational, Science and Writing. We hope to continue the success we have built on in the past and continue to raise our scores each year.

# Adult Education

Adult education is not just for those who want to get their GED. We also offer COMPASS test preparation and the Kentucky Employability Certificate.

COMPASS tests reading, math, and writing skills, and is designed to help place students in the appropriate college or vocational school classes. Based on the COMPASS Test or low ACT scores, students may be advised to take remedial classes for no credit before they can enter their program of study. Instead of paying to take remedial classes for no credit, we can give you remediation free of charge so that

you can score high enough on the COMPASS to enter your program of study.

We also offer WIN for WorkKeys, an assessment system created by ACT for use in the business community, offering job profiling, skills assessment, and instructional support. WorkKeys enables students to earn the Kentucky Employability Certificate. The KEC was created to provide skill-based credentials to Kentuckians to help them secure employment and give workers documentation of their skills proficiencies to present to prospective employers. The KEC is based on the

three skill areas: Reading for Information, Applied Math, and Locating Information. Students can work on their KEC here at the Adult Education Center, or students with Internet access can work at home. This program is ideal for someone without a college degree who wants documented skills to add to their resume.

## Elementary School News

- College students who binge drink at local bars.
- Pregnant women who drink and put their babies at risk for fetal alcohol syndrome.
- Professionals who drink after a long day of work.
- Senior citizens who drink out of loneliness.

### Warning Signs of Alcohol Abuse:

If you answer "yes" to any of the following questions, you may have a problem with alcohol:

- Do you drink alone when you feel angry or sad?
- Does your drinking ever make you late for work?
- Does your drinking worry your family?
- Do you ever drink after telling yourself you won't?
- Do you ever forget what you did while drinking?
- Do you get headaches or have a hangover after drinking?

**Kick Butts Day 2008!**

**Wednesday, April 2, 2008**

Sponsored by the Campaign for Tobacco-Free Kids, Kick Butts Day is an annual celebration of youth leadership and activism in the fight against tobacco use. This year, Kick Butts Day is focusing attention on the number 1200 – the number of Americans who die every day because of smoking and exposure to second-hand smoke (totaling 438,000 deaths a year, according to the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention). *There are 154 Kentuckians who die every week, due to tobacco related diseases.*

The Campaign for Tobacco-Free Kids and other public health advocates are calling on state and local elected officials to support scientifically proven measures to reduce tobacco use and its devastating toll. These measures include higher tobacco taxes, smoke-free air laws that require smoke-free workplaces and public places, and well-funded tobacco prevention and cessation programs. Health advocates are also calling on Congress to pass legislation granting the U.S. Food and Drug Administration authority over tobacco products, including the authority to crack down on tobacco marketing and sales to kids, require changes in tobacco products to make them less harmful and less addictive, and stop tobacco companies from making unsubstantiated claims that some tobacco products may be safer than others.

“On Kick Butts Day, kids are standing up against the tobacco companies, and it’s important that elected officials stand with them by supporting proven tobacco prevention measures,” said Matthew L. Myers, President of the Campaign for Tobacco-Free Kids. “The bad news about tobacco is that it is still the number one preventable cause of death in our country.”

The Toll of Tobacco in Kentucky is as follows:

**Tobacco Use in Kentucky**

High school students who smoke	<b>24.5% (55,400)</b>
Male high school students who use smokeless or spit tobacco	<b>25.4% (females use much lower)</b>
Kids (under 18) who become new daily smokers each year	<b>6,800</b>
Kids exposed to secondhand smoke at home	<b>363,000</b>
Packs of cigarettes bought or smoked by kids each year	<b>11.3 million</b>
Adults in Kentucky who smoke	<b>28.7% (916,400)</b>

Nationwide, youth smoking has declined dramatically since the mid 1990’s, but that decline appears to have slowed considerably or even stopped in recent years. Three *Zip* features at [www.kheaa.com](http://www.kheaa.com) provide important information that Kentucky students and parents need to help them learn about and apply for student financial aid. *Zip Access*, *Zip Decision* and *Zip Answer* are unique features available only on the Web site of the Kentucky Higher Education Assistance Authority (KHEAA).

*Zip Access* lets students apply for the Robert C. Byrd Honors Scholarship, KHEAA Teacher Scholarship and Early Childhood Development Scholarship and check the status of federal student loans guaranteed by KHEAA. The sign-in function for *Zip Access* is at the top of the KHEAA home page.

Parents will find *Zip Decision* a helpful online resource if they are applying for a Federal PLUS Loan to help pay for their child's education. Using *Zip Decision*, parents may get immediate pre-approval for a loan originated through KHEAA. The credit decision is valid for 120 days.

*Zip Answer* provides answers to hundreds of questions about state and federal student aid. Users may choose a topic or type a word or phrase into a search box. By choosing KEES as a topic, *Zip Answer* will bring up 44 of the most commonly asked questions and answers about KEES.
